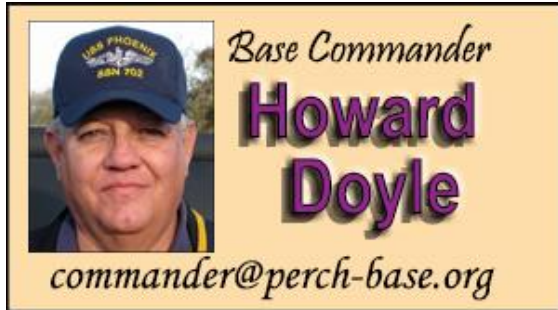
*Our organization's purpose is . . .*

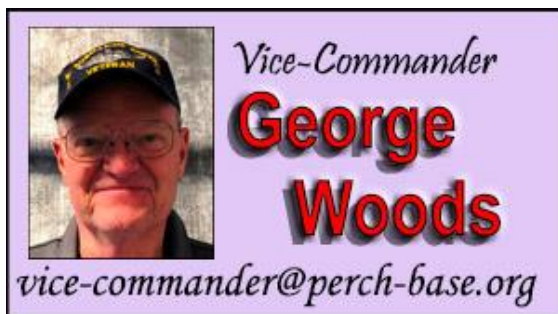
In February, there is the parade in Laveen so make your plans accordingly.

**House Approves Money For Carriers, Aircraft In  
 New FY 2020 Funding Bill**

The House of Representatives approved Fiscal Year 2020 funding for the Department of the Navy’s new ballistic missile submarine, the future frigate, Ford-class aircraft carrier, F/A18E/F Super Hornets and F-35 Lighting II Joint Strike Fighters.

The Navy and Marine Corps funding is part of the \$693.3 billion FY 2020 total for the Department of Defense and part of the \$1.4 trillion spending bill Senate and House negotiators created that avoids a possible federal government shutdown at the end of this week. The spending bill still needs Senate approval and Trump’s signature before becoming law.

“Today the House will appropriate essential funding for our troops and the Department of Defense. This action comes nearly three months into the fiscal

year, but it is not substantially different from the version passed by the House months ago,” read a statement from Rep. Mac Thornberry, (RTexas) the ranking member of the House Armed Services Committee.

The bill provides \$24 billion in FY 2020 funding for 14 ships, including:

- \$1.8 billion in advance funding for the Columbia-class ballistic missile submarine
- \$2.2 billion for the third and fourth Ford-class aircraft carriers
- \$1.3 billion for the future frigate
- \$5.3 billion for the Virginia-class submarine and \$3 billion an advanced funding for future submarines in the program.

The Pentagon funding also provides the Department of the Navy \$20 billion for aircraft, including for F/A-18E/F Super Hornets, F-35B and F-35C Lightning II Joint Strike Fighters, V-22 Osprey tiltrotor aircraft, P-8A Poseidon and E2D Hawkeye aircraft.

The Navy receives funding to field a force of 340,500 active duty personnel, an increase of 5,100 people from the FY 2019 funding. The Marine Corps is funded to field a force of 186,200 Marines, which is about the same as the FY 2019 funding.

However, the bill also addresses some concerns lawmakers have over how some of the Navy’s purchasing agreements are structured.

The funding bill provides \$407 million for the Navy to buy large unmanned surface vehicles in fiscal year 2020, but had limits. The Navy can’t arm LUSVs with missile-carrying vertical launch systems.

The Navy already has two large USVs, which are part of the Pentagon’s Overlord program that converted surface vessels to operate under autonomous controls. The Navy wants to take the existing LUSVs and the two new vessels to start Phase 2 testing for more advanced work on navigation, test hull, mechanical and electrical systems, and work with payloads and command and control systems.

## **The U.S. Navy’s New Orca Drone Submarine Could Get Offensive Role**

The U.S. Navy's Boeing Orca underwater drone could play an offensive role in future conflicts. Writing in the highly regarded U.S. Naval Institute (USNI) blog,

retired Commander Brian Dulla argues that the U.S. Navy should invest in mine laying capabilities. It's an arena where large drones like the Orca could have advantages.

Mine warfare feels neglected in the popular defense media. It may be perceived as old-fashioned or uninteresting. The reality can be quite different. Put yourself in the mind of a captain whose ship has just strayed into a minefield. Or the EOD (explosive ordnance disposal) diver sent to defuse the mines. Even low tech or vintage mines pose a very real threat to modern navies.

Commander Dulla's mine proposal is innovative. Yet like many good ideas it will seem obvious when you read it. He proposes to combine the range, autonomy and flexibility of a UUV (unmanned underwater vehicle) with the warhead of a mine. This allows it to be used as a moored mine that can propel itself into position, keeping the launch platform far from harms way. It could also be used as an extra slow torpedo to target ships in harbor. Because of its combined features Dulla terms this concept the 'moor-pedo.'

At the same time, underwater drones are a hot topic for the Navy. It's a natural pairing because mine laying is dangerous to perform, especially in the enemy's back yard. Aircraft, ships or submarines are put in harm's way and distracted from their primary purposes. Crewless platforms mitigate some of the inherent risks involved.

Although unmanned air vehicles (UAVs) have become a common sight on the battlefield, development has been slower in the undersea domain. And until now the majority of UUVs used by navies have been very small. To lay a minefield a UUV would have to be much larger, large enough to carry a useful number of mines.

Not surprisingly the U.S. is the first sea power to start building extra-large unmanned underwater vehicles (XLUUVs). But other navies are also entering the arena, including Britain and Japan. And China, Russia, and South Korea also have large UUV projects.

Dulla proposes that the Navy's large-displacement drones (LDUUV) could be employed. The Orca design will be even larger and therefore could patrol further and could carry more. The Orca is up to 85 feet long, an order of magnitude larger than anything else out there as the moment. It has a flexible payload section which is large enough to carry multiple torpedo sized payloads. Initially these could be smaller UUVs. In the future they could be Tomahawk cruise missiles, or as the USNI article implies, mines.

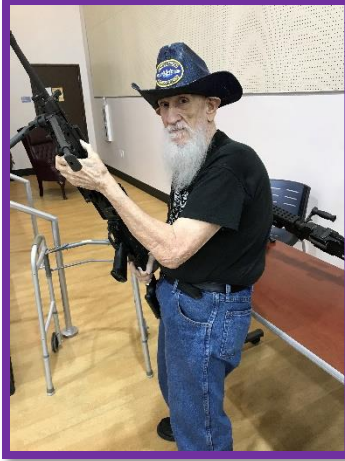
### Mesa Marketplace Military Day

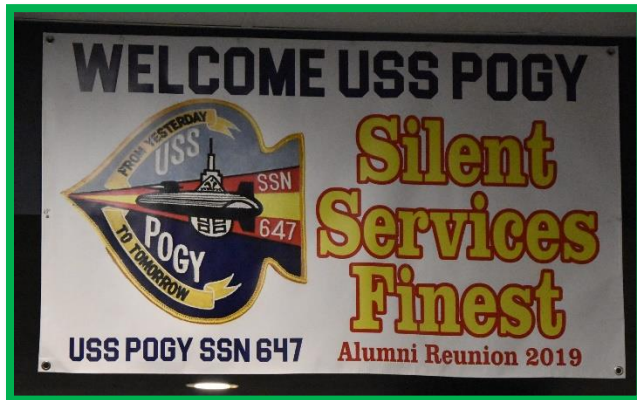

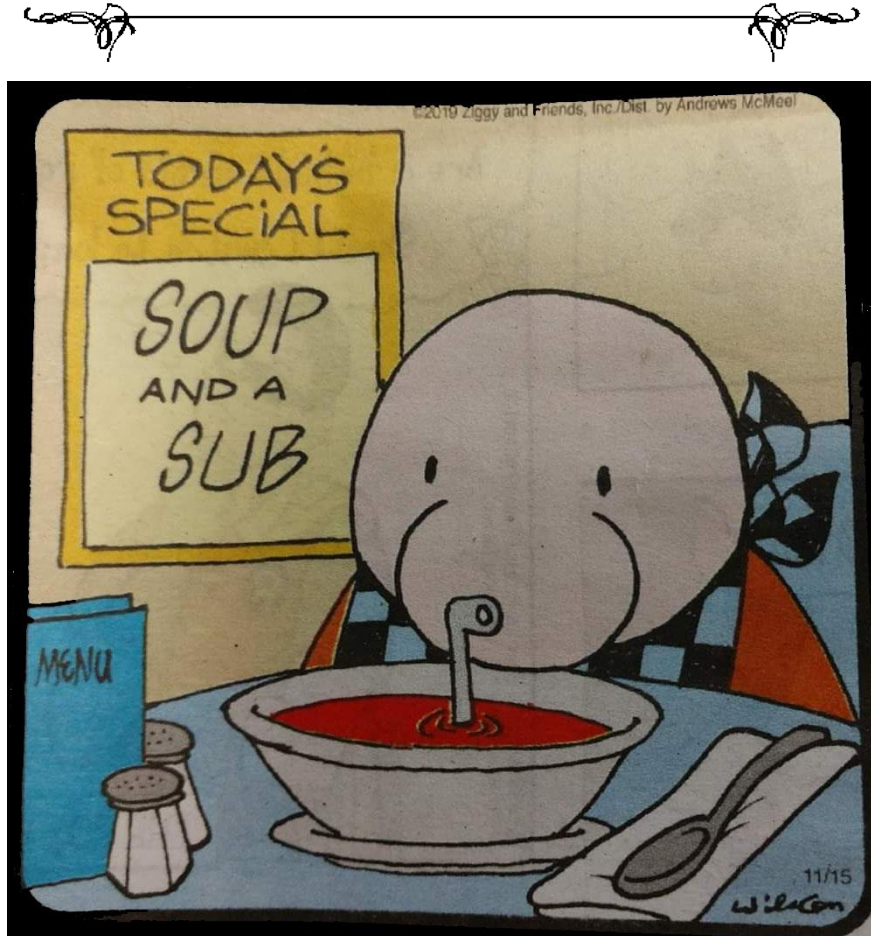
