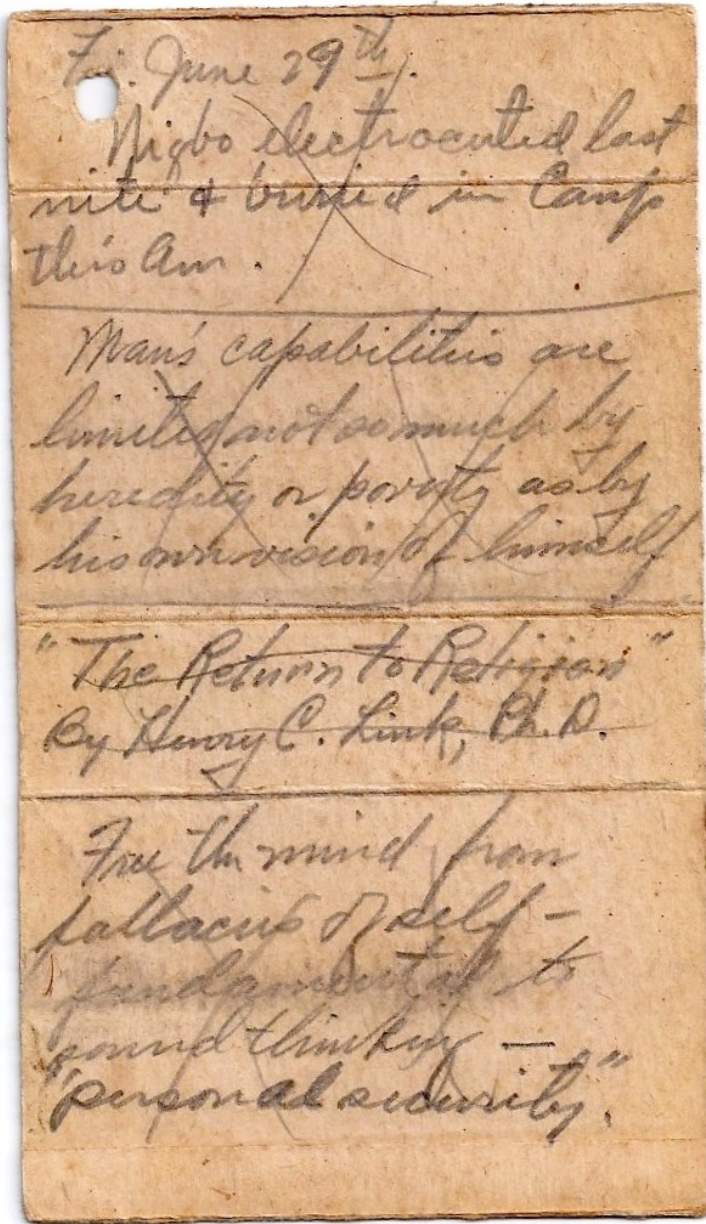

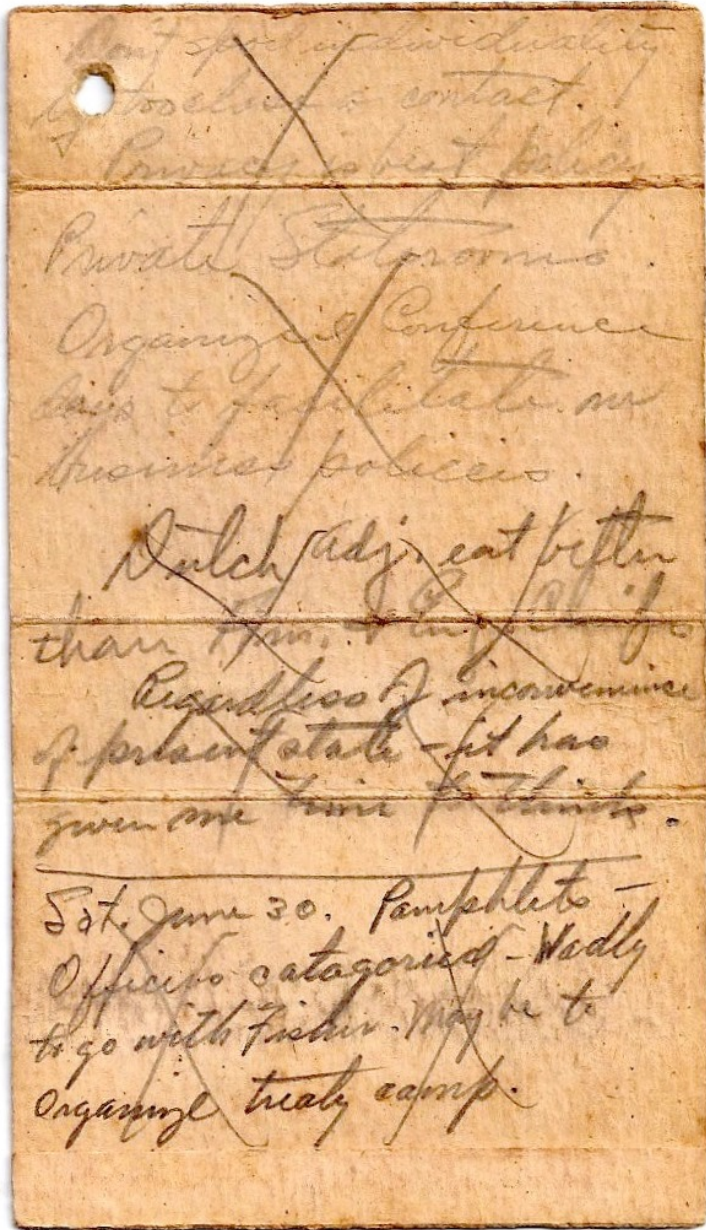
Don't know who "Nigbo" is. It could be a nickname, but could even be a Japanese guard.

At 1130 about eleven bombers right over camp shops & bombs (anti pers.) dropped in Rampoeng near by. Closest bomb about 200 yards from us.

Arti and I assigned to fire party as soon as planes left. Many pigs roasting alive & their squeals were pitiful - We (30) men put out three or four fires & Yash had us Ambul the edible pigs to our side.

At 1300 a bomber came right over low & machine gunned all around while we hit the ditch along the garden fence. One shot 50 Cal. Shell fell in the ditch right beside us (over)

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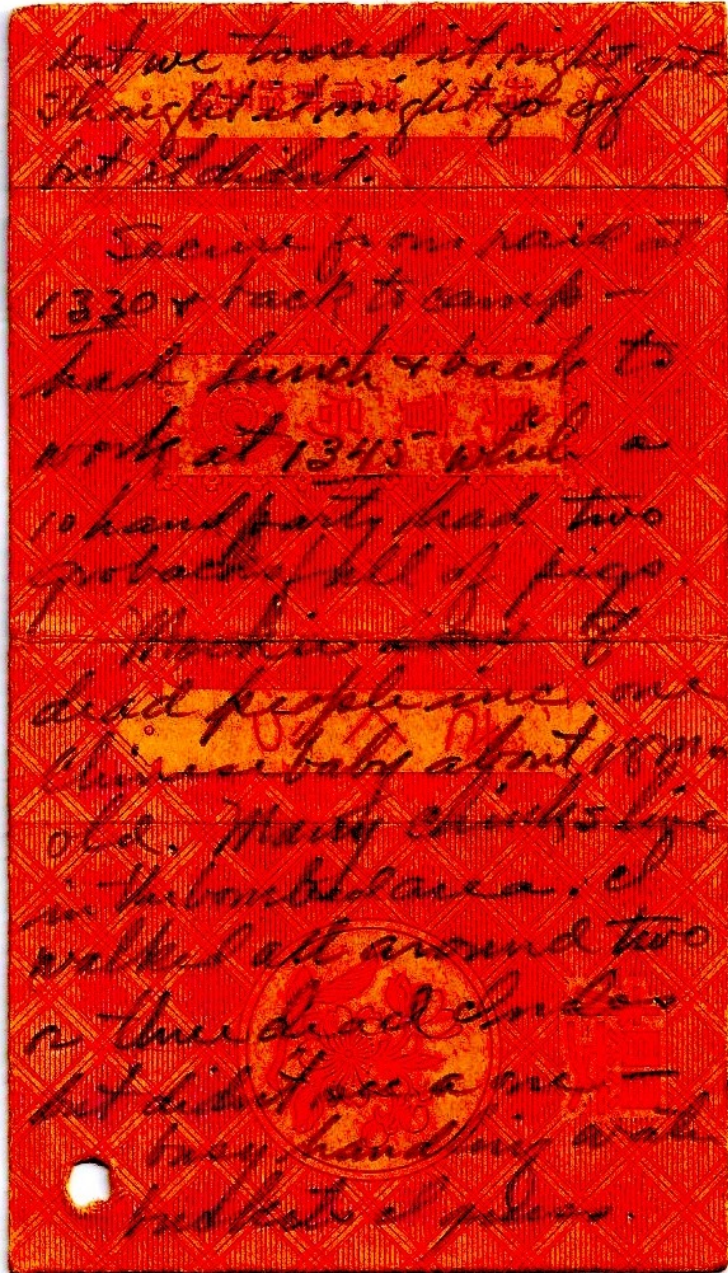

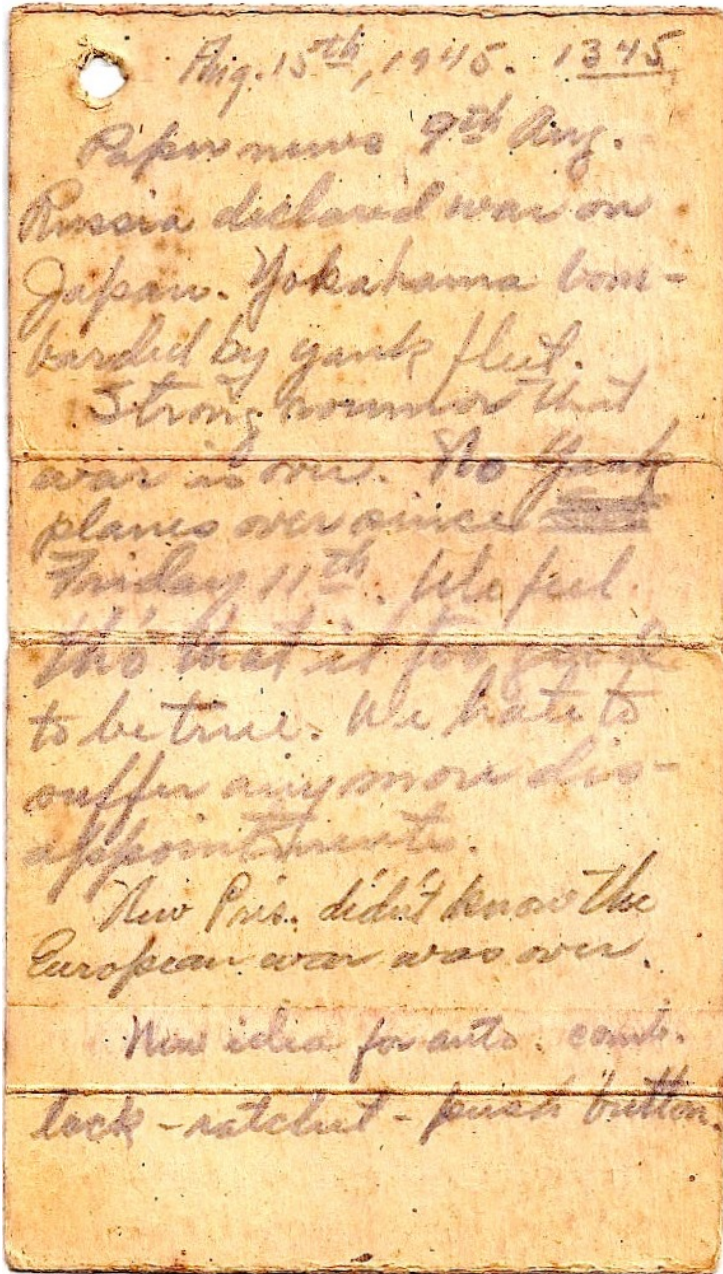

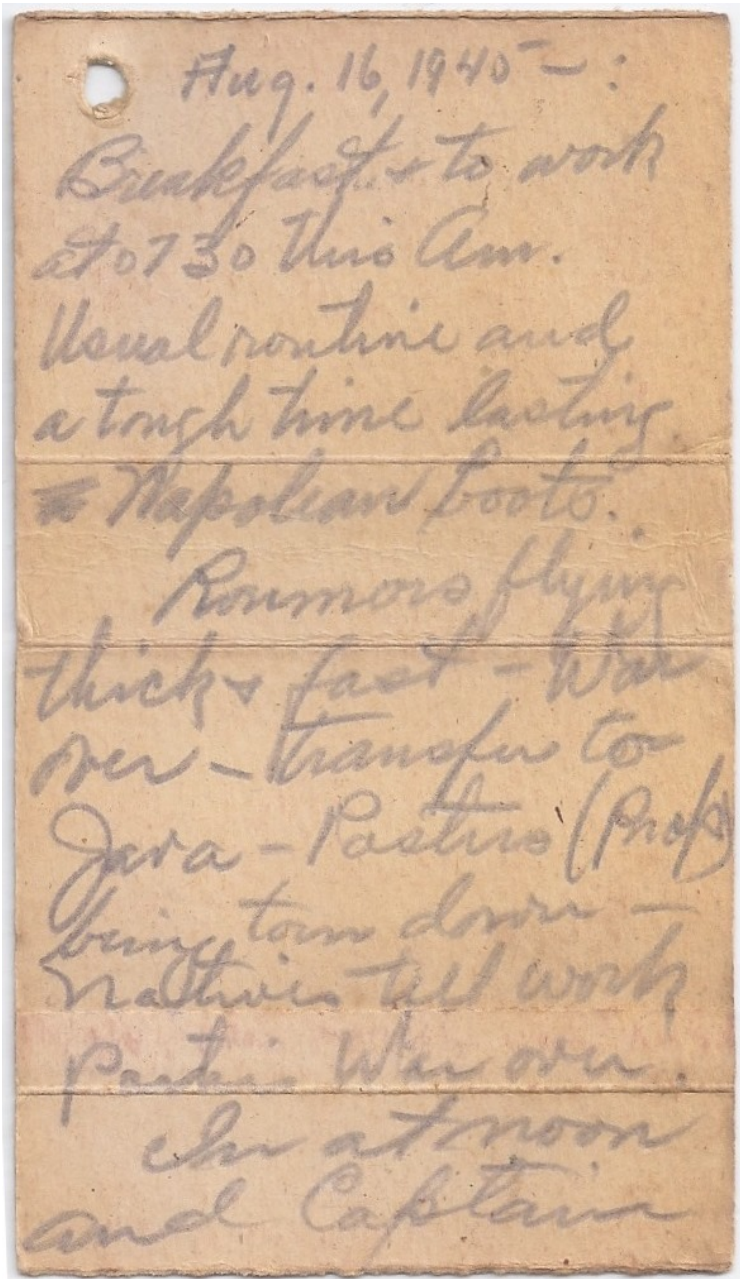
Even at the end, Pappy's inventive side pops it's head up with an automatic combination lock-ratchet-pushbutton!

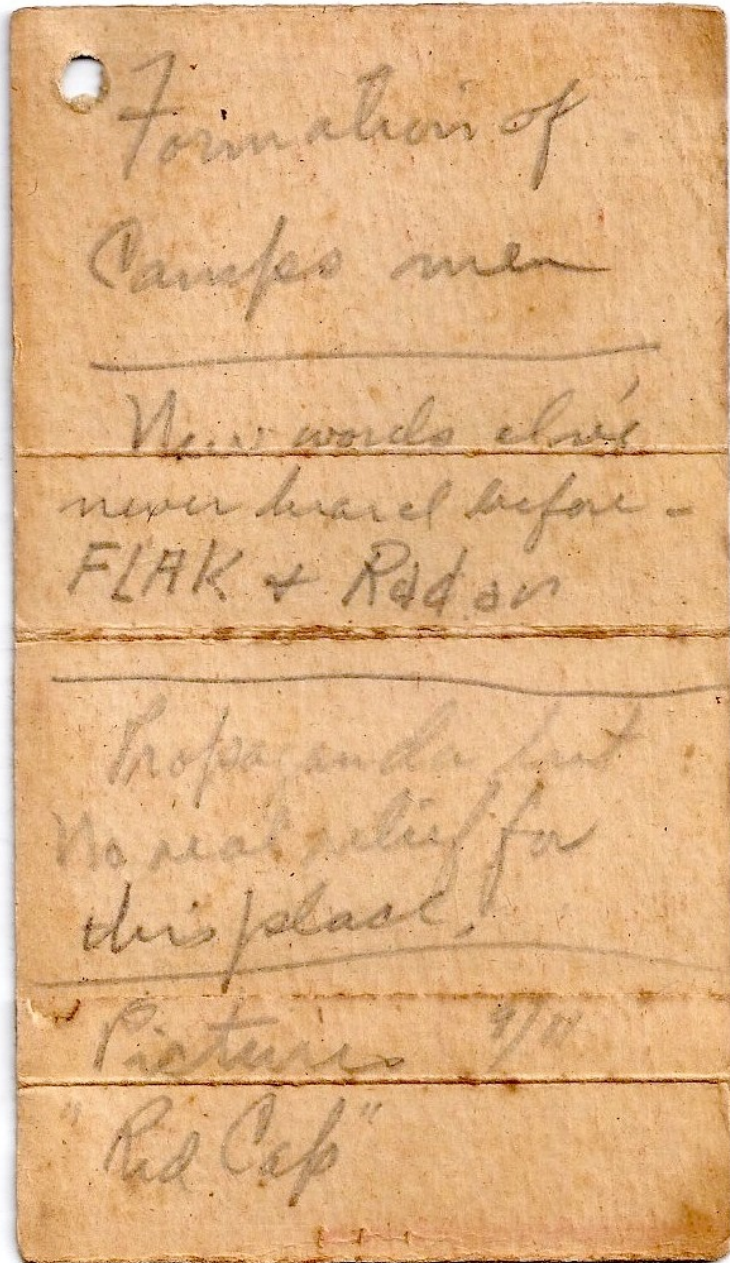

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The first atomic bomb was dropped on Aug. 6, 1945, on Hiroshima. The second was dropped on Nagasaki on Aug. 9. Until then, few people had ever heard of radon. FLAK was used throughout WW2, but Pappy was imprisoned thru most of WW2.

I don't know what the "Rad Cap" was.

Based on the statement of "no real relief," evidently no allied forces have arrived, yet.

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Similar to the previous journal entry, It is unclear if Pappy may have accumulated this business from magazines, or other POWs. Ironically, it is reasonable that he would want to get away from the Navy after his POW experience, but he did remain in the Navy until 1954.

The address is an actual address in Luton, in England, and there were English POWs in the camp from the sinking of HMS Exeter ships company after she was sunk on March 1st 1942.

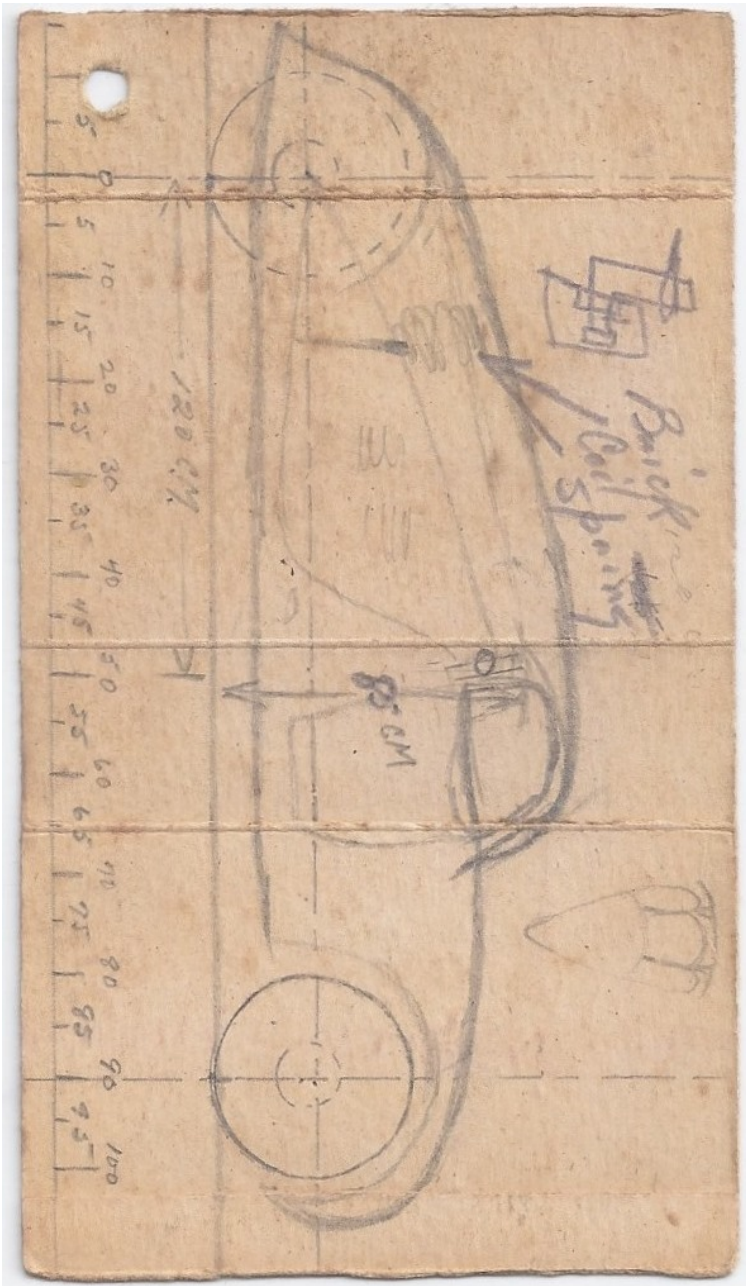

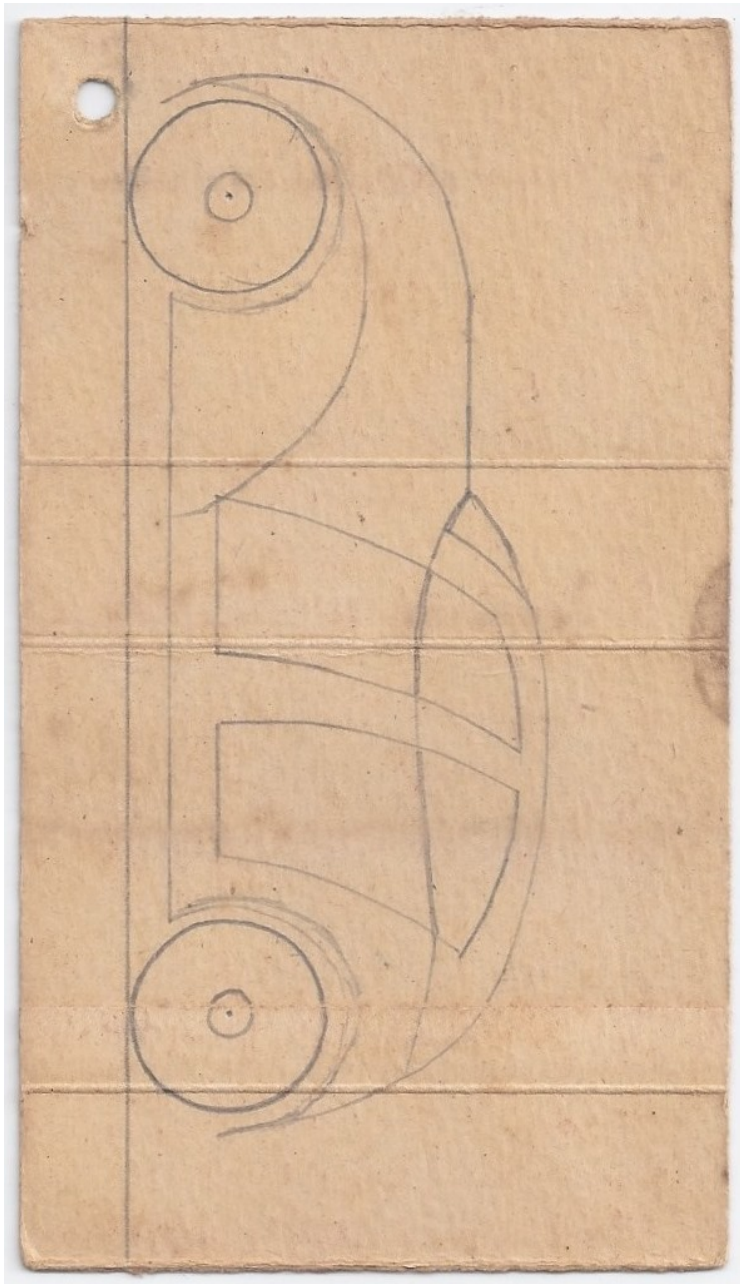

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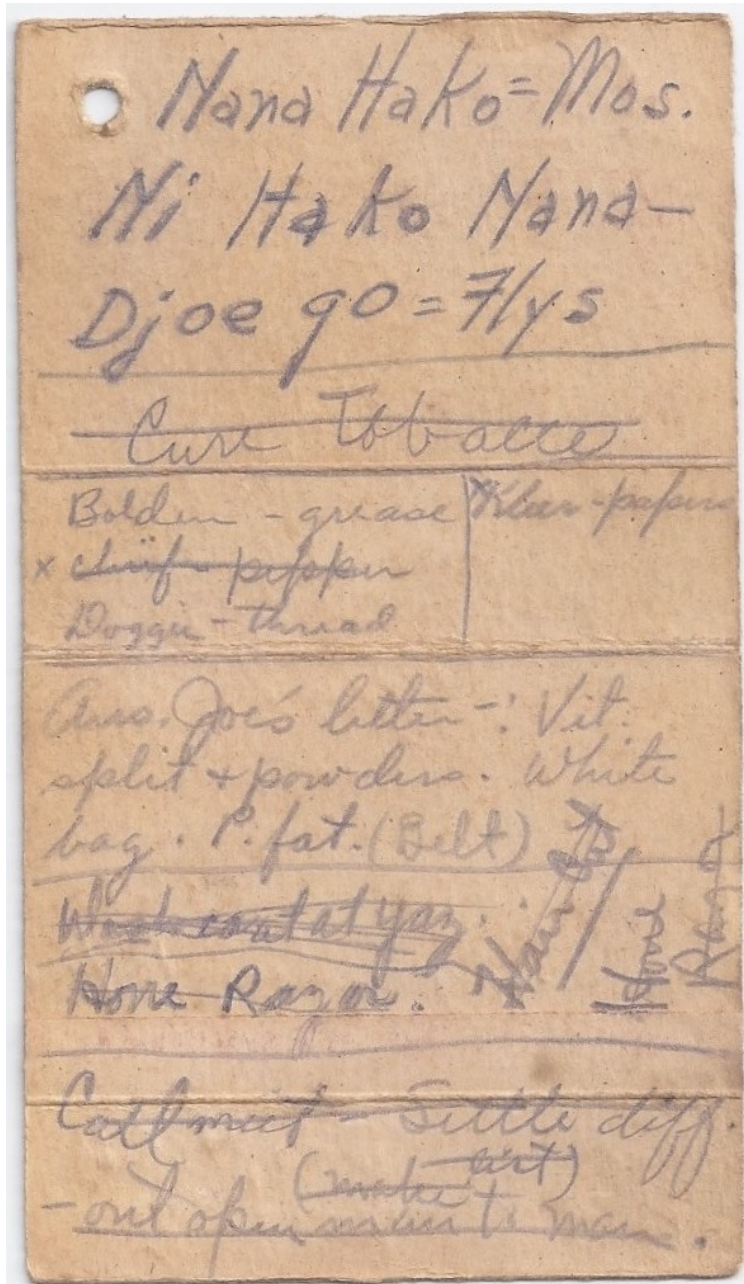

Not sure what the differences that needed to be settled, but Pappy appeared to be in a position of authority.

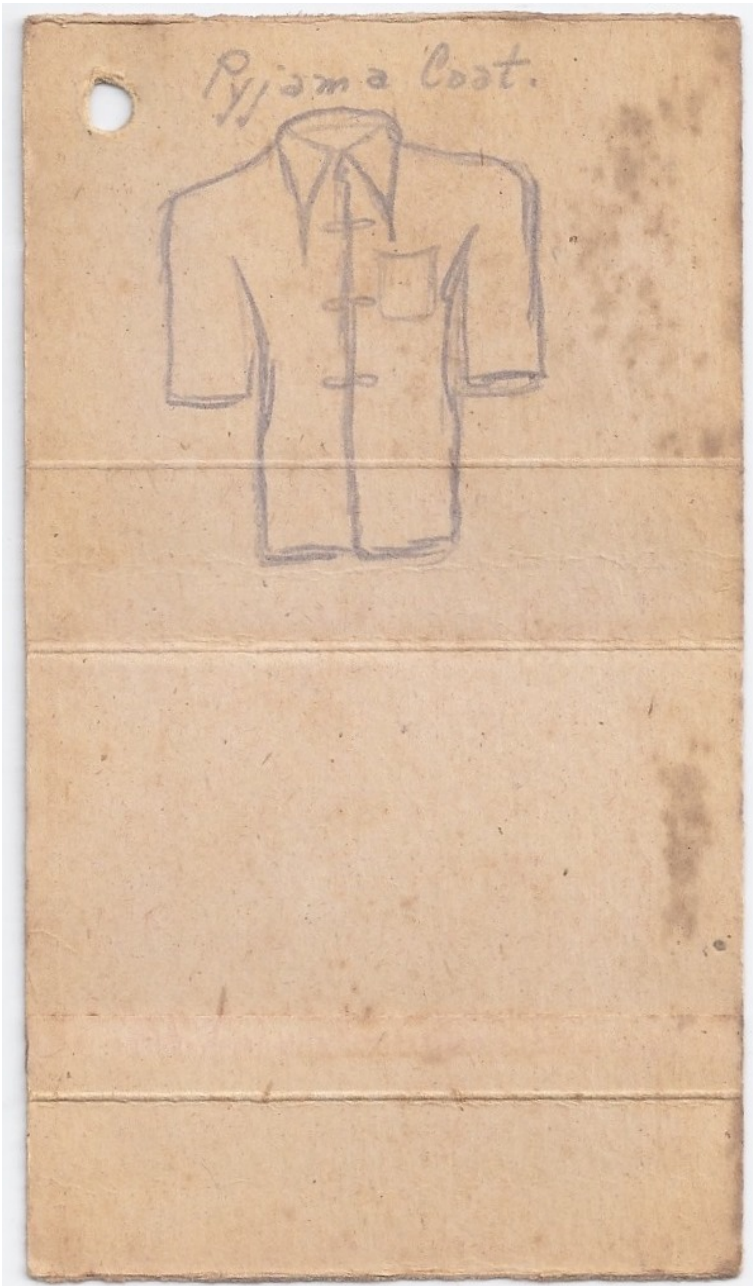
