Subj: VA BURIAL BENEFITS

Here is a packet of materials to give you information on your eligibility and the process for obtaining veteran burial benefits. My research at the VA and a large Funeral Service in Surprise, plus a visit with the staff at the **National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona**, has allowed me to put together this packet of information.

It quickly became evident that there is much misunderstanding among veterans regarding burial services that are provided by the government. For example:

Every veteran with any discharge other than dishonorable, who has at least 24 months of active duty, is eligible for the following free services;

- National or State Veterans cemetery grave site.
- Opening/closing and providing grave liner.
- Government headstone or marker.*
- Perpetual free care.
- Ceremonial full military honors.
- American flag (which the next of kin retains)
- "Presidential Memorial Certificate"
- * Headstones and markers are also provided for private internment.

Those who meet the following criteria, are eligible for **added** services, including fees for other burial and funeral costs (see flyer).

- Service related disability
- VA pension
- Died while in VA medical care

I've tried to include copies of the forms that you or your family will need to have completed. As you would expect, you will need proof of your service, generally in the form of a DD-214. A new form, which could help save time is the first form in the stack; "APPLICATION FOR PRE-NEED DETERMINATION OF ELIGIBILITY FOR BURIAL IN A VA NATIONAL CEMETERY." You could do that today and make things easier for those who survive you.

With over 1,700 veterans dying every day in this country, the real pros in doing all the paperwork are the funeral directors. They have all of the forms and paperwork and, frankly, can do it all for your family, as long as your survivors have that important DD-214.

At the end of the packet I've included information on Navy burial at sea. On the West Coast these are done from San Diego, Honolulu or Bremerton. Burial at sea of cremated remains is fairly straight forward, though may take awhile and your biggest duty is to get them to the port of embarkation at your own expense. You can have a small memorial service on the dock before the ship leaves port, though you cannot accompany. Remains not cremated have to meet a lot of expensive requirements including stainless steel casket, refrigerated storage, shipping etc.

I hope that this packet will be a good resource for your family when they have to deal with your passing. Please feel free to contact me at any time. I would be pleased to assist in any way that I am able.

As your chaplain, I am available to conduct a memorial service if needed.

10 IMPORTANT FACTS ABOUT YOUR VA BURIAL BENEFITS

As a veteran you may qualify for certain funeral benefits, but they don't come automatically. In most cases someone must request them, which can be time-consuming and stressful for your family. Dignity Memorial professionals are available to help you prepare your request in advance.

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS (VA) BENEFITS DO NOT COVER ALL THE FUNERAL OR CREMATION ARRANGEMENTS OF HONORABLY DISCHARGED VETERANS.

Certain monetary, recognition and service benefits may be available; however, reimbursement for funeral or cremation service expenses is limited and usually only applies to veterans who:

- > Veteran died because of a service-related disability, OR
- > The Veteran was receiving or was entitled to receive a VA pension or compensation at

the time of death, OR

> The Veteran died while hospitalized by VA, or while receiving care under contract at a non-VA facility

Standard guidelines are provided as an overview, but only the VA can rule on your exact benefits.

YOU WILL NEED DOCUMENTATION TO VERIFY MILITARY SERVICE.

You will normally be required to provide a *Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty* document to verify military service. (Before 1950 it is commonly known as the Report of Separation which includes the documents WD AGO 53-55, NAVPERS 553, NAVMC 78PD or NAVCG 553. After 1950 it is known as the DD 214). All documents are forms of a veteran's discharge papers.

A VETERAN'S FAMILY MUST REQUEST A UNITED STATES FLAG.

A flag is provided at no cost to drape the casket or accompany the urn of a deceased veteran. Generally, the flag is given to the next of kin. Only one flag may be provided per veteran. An Application for United States Flag for Burial Purposes (VA Form 27-2008) must be submitted along with a copy of the veteran's discharge papers. Flags may be obtained from VA regional offices and most U.S. Post Offices. Your Dignity Memorial provider will help your family request your flag.


MILITARY FUNERAL HONORS CEREMONIES MUST BE SCHEDULED IN ADVANCE.


The law entitles every eligible veteran to receive a military funeral honors ceremony, which includes the folding and presentation of the United States flag and the playing of "Taps," upon the family's request.

This Department of Defense program calls for the funeral director to request military funeral honors on behalf of the veteran's family.

Your Dignity Memorial provider works with various veterans organizations to assist in the provision of military funeral honors.

VETERANS' CASKETS ARE NOT FREE.

As a standard policy, neither the VA nor the various branches of service provide a free casket for a deceased veteran, unless death occurs while on active duty. Through our unique relationship with American Legion Departments in specific states and with the Veterans of Foreign Wars nationally, Dignity Memorial providers offer caskets and other merchandise at a discounted price to their members.

A "PRESIDENTIAL MEMORIAL CERTIFICATE" MUST BE REQUESTED.

Provided through a program initiated in March 1962 by President John F. Kennedy, an engraved paper "Presidential Memorial Certificate" signed by the current president is provided to families to honor the memory of honorably discharged, deceased veterans.

Eligible recipients, or someone acting on their behalf, may apply in person at any VA regional office or by U.S. mail. Your local Dignity Memorial provider can assist your family in obtaining this certificate.

IF YOU CHOOSE NOT TO BE BURIED IN A VA NATIONAL CEMETERY, MONETARY BURIAL BENEFITS ARE LIMITED.

Veterans buried in a private cemetery may be eligible to receive a partial reimbursement for their burial costs. If a death is service-related, benefits up to \$2,000 may be paid for burial expenses.

In order to receive burial and funeral benefits, as well as plot allowances, there are specific requirements that must be met such as:

- > The Veteran died because of a service-related disability, OR
- > The Veteran was receiving or was entitled to receive a VA pension or compensation at the

time of death, OR

> The Veteran died while hospitalized by the VA, or while receiving care under VA contract at a non-VA facility.

Based upon eligibility requirements described earlier, for non-service-related deaths on or after October 1, 2011, the VA will pay up to \$700.00 toward burial and funeral expenses (if hospitalized by the VA at time of death), or \$300 toward burial and funeral expenses (if not hospitalized by the VA at time of death), and a \$700.00 plot-internment allowance (if not buried in a national cemetery). An annual increase in burial and plot allowances will be based on the Consumer Price Index for the preceding 12-month period.

The final amounts will be determined by eligibility and are at the discretion of the VA.

In order to determine the final reimbursement amount, an *Application for Burial Benefits* (VA Form 21-530) must be submitted within two years from the date of the veteran's permanent burial. If your family does not have the Form 21-530 at the time of death, your Dignity Memorial provider will help secure one.

THERE ARE ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR BURIAL IN A VA NATIONAL CEMETERY.

Any member of the Armed Forces who dies while on active duty or any veteran who was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable is entitled to burial in a VA national cemetery. Under certain conditions, the surviving spouse and minor children of an eligible person may also be entitled to this benefit.

In addition, non-veteran parents may be interred in a national cemetery with their child if that child was killed in combat and has no other eligible survivors. In order for such burial to occur, an official must determine that there is available space.

Burial in a VA national cemetery includes:

- > An assigned gravesite (if space is available)
- > A government headstone or marker
- > Opening and closing of the grave
- > Perpetual care at no cost to the family
- > A grave liner for casketed remains

Cremated remains are buried or inurned in VA national cemeteries in the same manner and with the same honors as casketed remains.

HEADSTONES, MARKERS OR MEDALLIONS FOR A BURIAL SPACE IN A PRIVATE CEMETERY MUST BE REQUESTED.

Any deceased veteran discharged under conditions other than dishonorable is eligible for a standard Government headstone, marker or medallion. The VA, upon request and at no charge to the applicant, will furnish a Government headstone or marker for the grave of any deceased eligible veteran in any cemetery around the world. A bronze medallion in several sizes is also available to be placed on existing privately purchased headstones or markers. The Government is not responsible for costs associated with affixing the medallion to the privately purchased headstone or marker.

Upright headstones are available in granite or marble, and flat markers are available in granite, marble, or bronze. The style must be consistent with existing monuments or markers at the place of burial.

Niche markers for cremated remains are also available.

An "Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker for Installation in a Private or State Veteran's Cemetery" (VA Form 40-1330) must be submitted for headstones or markers. VA Form 40-1330M must be submitted if requesting the medallion.

If your family does not have form 40-1330 or VA form 40-1330M, your Dignity Memorial provider will help secure one.

THE ISSUANCE OR REPLACEMENT OF MILITARY SERVICE MEDALS, AWARDS AND DECORATIONS MUST BE REQUESTED IN WRITING.

For deceased veterans, requests for medals will be accepted from the next-of-kin. Requests should be submitted in writing to the appropriate military service branch division of the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC). To submit a request, use Standard Form 180 (SF-180), available through the VA or downloadable through the NPRC website at www.archives.gov/veterans/. There is generally no charge for medal or award replacements.

For more information, or for the mailing address of the military branch office to submit your request to, call 866-272-6272 or visit the NPRC website. If your family does not have the necessary form, a Dignity Memorial provider will help secure one.

ABOUT MILITARY FUNERAL HONORS

The military funeral honors ceremony is a final demonstration of our nation's deep gratitude to those who have, in times of war and peace, faithfully served. The U.S. Department of Defense now provides, at no cost, the rendering of military funeral honors for an eligible veteran if requested by the family. Families of eligible veterans request funeral honors through their funeral director, who is responsible for arranging for the funeral honors detail.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

- > members on active duty
- > retirees
- > and former members of the Selected Reserve
- > U.S. veterans of any war
- > Other U.S. veterans who served at least one term of enlistment and separated under conditions other than dishonorable

WHO IS NOT ELIGIBLE?

- > Individuals discharged from the Armed Forces under dishonorable conditions
- Individuals sentenced to death or life imprisonment without parole for a federal or state capital offense

As provided by law, the honor guard detail shall consist of not less than two members of the Armed Forces, one of whom is a representative of the parent branch of service of the deceased veteran. The honor detail will, at a minimum, perform a ceremony that includes the folding and presentation of the American flag to the next of kin and the playing of "Taps," either by a bugler or by official electronic recording. The veteran's parent service representative will present the flag.

Your Dignity Memorial provider can help your family request military funeral honors.

The request form is included in this guide.

VERIFYING ELIGIBILITY

The preferred method for verifying eligibility is the DD 214, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty. If the DD 214 is not available, any discharge document showing other than dishonorable service can be used.

Arranging Burial in a VA National Cemetery

- Burial in a national cemetery is open to all members of the armed forces and Veterans who have met minimum active service duty requirements and were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. Their spouse, widow or widower, minor children, and, under certain conditions, unmarried adult children with disabilities, may also be eligible for burial. Eligible spouses and children may be buried, even if they predecease the Veteran. Members of the reserve components of the armed forces who die while on active duty or while performing training duty, or were eligible for retired pay, may also be eligible for burial.
- Gravesites in Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) national cemeteries cannot be reserved in advance. However, families are encouraged to prepare in advance by discussing cemetery options and setting aside copies of any discharge documents.
- VA will provide—at no cost to the Veteran's family—a gravesite, headstone
 or marker, Presidential Memorial Certificate, U.S. flag, perpetual care of the
 gravesite and will open and close the grave. Fees for services provided
 by funeral directors and other related costs must be paid for by the Veteran's
 family.
- VA's Veterans Benefits Administration pays a burial and plot allowance for those Veterans who are eligible by law. For information, please contact the nearest VA regional office at 1-800-827-1000.
- To establish eligibility for burial in a VA national cemetery, the family should provide: the Veteran's discharge document; report of casualty; or the Veteran's full name; military rank; branch of service; dates of entry and discharge; serial, Social Security, and/or VA claim numbers; date and place of birth; and date of death.

Burial in a National Cemetery

Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of our 124 national cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a Government headstone or marker, a burial flag, and a Presidential Memorial Certificate, at no cost to the family. Some veterans may also be eligible for Burial Allowances. Cremated remains are buried or inurned in national cemeteries in the same manner and with the same honors as casketed remains.

Burial benefits available for spouses and dependents buried in a national cemetery include burial with the veteran, perpetual care, and the spouse or dependents name and date of birth and death will be inscribed on the veteran's headstone, at no cost to the family.

Preparing in Advance

For Burial in a VA National Cemetery

Gravesites in <u>Department of Veterans Affairs</u> (VA) national cemeteries cannot be reserved in advance; however, reservations made prior to 1962 will be honored. Families are encouraged to prepare in advance by discussing cemetery options, collecting the veteran's military information including discharge papers, and by contacting the cemetery where burial is desired.

For Burial in a Private Cemetery

We suggest that if burial will be in a private cemetery and a Government headstone or marker will be requested for the veteran's grave, that the family complete <u>VA Form 40-1330</u>, <u>Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker for Installation in a Private or State Veterans' Cemetery</u>, in advance and place it with the veterans military discharge papers for use at the time of need.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING VA FORM 40-10007 APPLICATION FOR PRE-NEED DETERMINATION OF ELIGIBILITY FOR BURIAL IN A VA NATIONAL CEMETERY

For more complete information on eligibility requirements for burial in a VA national cemetery, visit the National Cemetery Administration online at http://www.cem.va.gov/cem/burial_benefits/eligible.asp or call the National Cemetery Scheduling Office at 1-800-535-1117. For the purposes of this form, the term burial includes inurnment (above ground remains placement in a columbarium) and scattering of ashes, (if the cemetery chosen offers those options). A Pre-Need determination of eligibility does not guarantee burial in a specific VA national cemetery. Burial in a specific VA national cemetery will be scheduled at the Time of Need. In order to assist in completing this form, specific instructions and explanations for certain items are given below.

SECTION I: VETERAN/SERVICEMEMBER

Eligibility for burial in a VA national cemetery is based on the qualifying service of a Veteran/Servicemember. This section of the form is used to determine if qualifying service exists. Not all items are mandatory, however, answers to questions will aid VA in searching for records in archives to support the claim.

- Military status used to apply for eligibility determination: For VA benefit purposes, a Veteran is a person who served in the active military, naval, or air service, and who was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. VA will determine on a case-by-case basis whether certain Reserve duty qualifies. If eligibility derives from a status not listed, or if the individual is not certain of the status, check "Other" and submit evidence of service and VA will provide appropriate assistance. Servicemembers who die on active duty are eligible for burial. If you are arranging burial for an active duty Servicemember or his or her dependents, you should contact a local funeral home or the National Cemetery Scheduling Office at 1-800-535-1117 to expedite processing.
- **Discharge Character of Service:** Please indicate one type of "Discharge Character of Service": Honorable; General; Entry Level Separation/Uncharacterized; Other Than Honorable; Bad Conduct; or Dishonorable. If uncertain of the type of discharge or Item 17 character of service, indicate "Other" and include available supporting documents.
- Supporting military service documents: VA recommends that you attach photocopies of readily available supporting documents Item 22 so that we can make the determination quickly. Documents may include the most recent discharge document (DD Form 214) showing the highest rank and valor awards and decorations, active duty service records other than for training purposes, or active duty for a minimum of 24 continuous months for enlisted Servicemembers after September 7, 1980; for officers, after October 16, 1981, or the full period for which the person was called to active duty. If you are unable to locate copies of military records, apply anyway, as VA will attempt to obtain records necessary to make a determination.

SECTION II: CLAIMANT INFORMATION

Each Claimant requires a separate VA Form 40-10007. Item 23

23b. Spouse means a person who is or was legally married to a Veteran. Surviving Spouse mean a person who was legally married to a Veteran at the time of the Veteran's death and includes a surviving spouse who had a subsequent remarriage. A non-Veteran spouse of a Veteran whose marriage to the Veteran was dissolved by divorce or annulment issued by an authoritative court is not eligible for burial in a VA national cemetery.

23c. An unmarried adult child of the Veteran is an individual who became permanently physically or mentally disabled and incapable of self-support before reaching 21 years of age, or before reaching 23 years of age if pursuing a full-time course of instruction at an approved educational institution. If you are making a claim for an unmarried adult child, please provide supporting documentation such as recent medical documentation pertaining to the disability, date of onset of the disability, and the age of the child when diagnosed with this disability. VA recommends that you provide photocopies. Note: Minor children of eligible Veterans are eligible for burial in a VA national cemetery. The minor child of an eligible Veteran is a child who is unmarried and who is under 21 years of age; or who is under 23 years of age and is pursuing a full-time course of instruction at an approved educational institution.

23d. Please explain your Claimant status or relationship to the Veteran/Servicemember.

Burial in a specific VA national cemetery will be scheduled at the time of need. If you provide an email address, VA may use your email address to communicate with you about your claim and burial benefits.

The pre-need application must be signed (Item 31) and dated (Item 32) for VA to process. Items 31 and 32

You must indicate your relationship to the claimant in Item 33.

33b. Check (B) and complete Items 34-37 if your are signing for a claimant who has not attained the age of 18 years, is mentally incompetent, or is physically unable to sign the pre-need application. You may be a court-appointed representative, a person who is responsible for the care of the individual (including a spouse or other relative), or an attorney in fact or agent authorized to act on behalf of the claimant under a durable power or attorney. If the claimant is in the care of an institution, a manager or principal officer of the institution may sign the form. Please attach supporting documents or an affidavit establishing your position relative to

VA considers the requested information relevant and necessary to determine maximum benefits under the law.

Respondent Burden: Public reporting burden for this collection of information is estimated to average 20 minutes per response, including the time to review instructions, search existing data sources, gather the necessary data, and complete and review the collection of information. The obligation to respond is voluntary and not required to obtain or retain benefits.

BURIAL AND PLOT INTERMENT ALLOWANCE



WHAT ARE VA BURIAL ALLOWANCES?

VA burial allowances are flat-rate monetary benefits that are generally paid at the maximum amount authorized by law for an eligible Veteran's burial and funeral costs. A VA regulation change in 2014 simplified the program to pay eligible survivors quickly and efficiently. Eligible surviving spouses of record are paid automatically upon notification of a Veteran's death, without the need to submit a claim. VA may grant additional benefits, including the plot or interment allowance and transportation allowance, if it receives a claim for these benefits.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

If the burial benefit has not been automatically paid to the surviving spouse, VA will pay the first living person to file a claim of those listed below:

- The Veteran's surviving spouse, **OR**
- The survivor of a legal union* between the deceased Veteran and the survivor, **OR**
- The Veteran's children, regardless of age, **OR**
- The Veteran's parents or surviving parent, **OR**
- The executor or administrator of the estate of the deceased Veteran *Legal union means a formal relationship between the decedent and the survivor existed on the date of the Veteran's death, which was recognized under the law of the State in which the couple formalized the relationship and evidenced by the State's issuance of documentation memorializing the relationship.

The Veteran must have been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. In addition, at least one of the following conditions must be met:

- The Veteran died as a result of a service-connected disability, **OR**
- The Veteran was receiving VA pension or compensation at the time of death, **OR**
- The Veteran was entitled to receive VA pension or compensation, but decided to receive his or her full military retirement or disability pay, **OR**
- The Veteran died while hospitalized by VA, or while receiving care under VA contract at a non-VA facility, **OR**
- The Veteran died while traveling under proper authorization and at VA expense to, or from, a specified place for the purpose of examination, treatment, or care, **OR**
- The Veteran had an original or reopened claim for VA compensation or pension pending at the time of death and would have been entitled to benefits from a date prior to the date of death,
- The Veteran died on, or after, October 9, 1996, while a patient at a VA-approved state nursing home.



HOW MUCH DOES VA PAY?

Service-Connected Death

If the Veteran died on or after September 1, 2001, the maximum service-connected burial allowance is \$2,000. If the Veteran died before September 11, 2001, the maximum service-connected burial allowance is \$1,500. If the Veteran is buried in a VA national cemetery, VA may reimburse some or all of the costs of transporting the deceased Veteran's remains.

Non Service-Connected Death

- If the Veteran died on or after October 1, 2016, VA will pay a \$300 burial allowance and \$749 for a plot.
- If the Veteran died on or after October 1, 2015, but before October 1, 2016, VA will pay a \$300 burial allowance and \$747 for a plot.
- If the Veteran died on or after October 1, 2014, but before October 1, 2015, VA will pay \$300 for burial allowance and \$745 for a plot.

Effective October 1, 2011, there are higher non-service-connected death rates payable if the Veteran was hospitalized by VA at the time of his or her death.

- If the Veteran died on or after October 1, 2016, VA will pay a \$749 burial allowance and \$749 for a plot.
- If the Veteran died on or after October 1, 2015, but before October 1, 2016, VA will pay a \$747 burial allowance and \$747 for a plot.
- If the Veteran died on or after October 1, 2014, but before October 1, 2015, VA will pay a \$745 burial allowance and \$745 for a plot.

If the death occurred while the Veteran was properly hospitalized by VA, or under VA contracted nursing home care, some or all of the costs for transporting the Veteran's remains may be reimbursed.

Note: If the Veteran dies while traveling at VA expense for the purpose of examination, treatment, or care, VA will pay burial and plot allowances and transportation expenses.

Unclaimed Remains

If a Veteran dies and their remains are unclaimed, the entity responsible for the burial of the Veteran would be entitled to a \$300 burial allowance. If the Veteran is buried in a VA national cemetery, VA may reimburse the cost of transporting the deceased Veterans remains. VA may also reimburse for the cost of a plot.

HOW CAN YOU APPLY?

You can apply by completing VA Form 21P-530 Application for Burial Benefits. You should attach a copy of the Veteran's military discharge document (DD Form 214 or equivalent) and a death certificate. If you are claiming transportation expenses, please attach a receipt for the expenses paid.

You can call us toll-free within the U.S. by dialing 1-800-827-1000. If you are located in the local dialing area of a VA regional office, you can also call us by checking your local telephone directory. For the hearing impaired, our TDD number is 711.

Certain other individuals may also be eligible for the headstone or marker. Headstones or markers for all individuals in a national or post cemetery are furnished automatically without request from the family.

IMPORTANT - READ THESE INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY

PRIVACY ACT INFORMATION: The responses you submit are considered confidential (38 U.S.C. 5701). They may be disclosed outside the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) only if the disclosure is authorized under the Privacy Act, including the routine uses identified in the VA system of records, 58VA21/22/28, Compensation, Pension, Education and Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment Records - VA, published in the Federal Register. The requested information is considered relevant and necessary to determine maximum benefits under the law and is required to obtain benefits. Information submitted is subject to verification through computer matching programs with other agencies.

RESPONDENT BURDEN: We need this information to determine your eligibility burial benefits. Title 38, United States Code, allows us to ask for this information. We estimate that you will need an average of 22 minutes to review the instructions, find the information, and complete this form. VA cannot conduct or sponsor a collection of information unless a valid OMB control number is displayed. 1. GENERAL

- a. BURIAL ALLOWANCE An amount towards the expenses of the funeral and burial of the veteran's remains. Burial includes all recognized methods of interment.
- b. PLOT ALLOWANCE Plot means the final resting place of the remains. The allowance is payable towards:
 - (1) Expenses incurred for the plot or interment if burial was not in a national cemetery or other cemetery under the jurisdiction of the United States; OR
 - (2) Expenses payable to a State (or political subdivision) if the veteran died from non service-connected causes and was buried in a State-owned cemetery or section used solely for the remains of persons eligible for burial in a national cemetery.
- c. BURIAL ALLOWANCE FOR SERVICE-CONNECTED DEATH When the veteran's death occurred as the result of a service-connected disability, a special "service-connected" rate is payable.
- d. TRANSPORTATION EXPENSES The cost of transporting the body to the place of burial may be paid in addition to the burial allowance when:
 - (1) The veteran died of a service-connected disability or had a compensable service-connected disability and burial is in a national cemetery; OR
 - (2) The veteran died while in a hospital, domiciliary or nursing home to which he/she had been properly admitted under authority of VA; OR
 - (3) The veteran died en route while traveling under prior authorization of VA for the purpose of examination, treatment or care.

2. WHO SHOULD FILE A CLAIM

- a. CREDITOR If expenses have not been paid, the claim should be filed by the funeral director or crematory service by completing Parts I, II, and IV. If the funeral director or crematory service has paid or advanced funds for or furnished the plot or interment expenses, inclusion of these items on the statement of account will serve as claim for the plot allowance. If cemetery owner or other creditor has not been paid for the plot and related interment expenses, he/she may file claim by completing Parts I, III, and IV. If both the funeral director and cemetery owner are unpaid, each must submit a separate VA Form 21-530 signed by the person who authorized services.
- b. PERSON WHOSE FUNDS WERE USED If all creditors have been paid, the claim should be filed by the person or persons whose personal funds were used by completing Parts I, II, and IV.

- c. VETERAN'S ESTATE If the expenses were paid from the veteran's estate, the claim should be filed by the executor/administrator by completing Parts I, II, and IV. Submit a copy of the letters of administration or letters testamentary certified over the signature and seal of the appointing court.
- d. STATE If a veteran whose death is non service-connected was buried without charge for plot or interment in a State-owned cemetery or section used for persons eligible in a national cemetery, the claim may be filed by the State official completing Parts I, III (Items 23 and 24), and IV.
- 3. TIME LIMIT FOR FILING A CLAIM A claim for non service-connected burial expenses or plot allowance must be filed with VA within 2 years from the date of the veteran's permanent burial or cremation. If a veteran's discharge was corrected after death to "Under Conditions Other Than Dishonorable," the claim must be filed within 2 years from the date of correction. The 2-year limitation does not apply to service-connected burial benefits, transportation expenses or reimbursement of headstone expenses.
- 4. COMPLETING CLAIM BY A FIRM OR STATE AGENCY The claim must be executed in the full name of the firm or State agency, and show the official position or connection of the individual who signs on its behalf.
- 5. PROOF OF DEATH TO ACCOMPANY CLAIM Death in a government institution does not need to be proven. In other cases, the claimant must forward a copy of the public record of death. If proof has previously been furnished VA, it need not be submitted again.

6. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNT MUST ACCOMPANY CLAIM

- a. FUNERAL DIRECTOR A statement of account on the funeral director's letterhead must show the name of the veteran; the nature and cost of services, including any payments made to another funeral home (show name and address); all credits; and the name of the person or persons by whom payment in whole or in part was made.
- b. TRANSPORTATION If transported by common carrier, a receipt must accompany the claim. All receipts for transportation charges should show the name of the veteran, the name of the person who paid and the amount of the charges. The itemized statement of account should show the charges made for transportation. Failure to itemize charges may result in delay or payment of a lesser amount.
- c. ACCOUNT PAID IN FULL The statement of account should be receipted in the name of the firm or individual performing the services. Bills or receipts filed in support of this claim become a part of the permanent record and will not be returned, unless specifically requested.
- d. PLOT ALLOWANCE ONLY In a claim for the plot allowance only, the statement of account must show the cost of the veteran's individual grave site, the mausoleum vault, or the columbarium niche.
- 7. BURIAL ASSOCIATION OR BURIAL INSURANCE If the veteran was a member of a burial association or if any insurance company is obligated to pay all or part of the burial expenses, Item 22 should be answered "Yes." It will be necessary to support the claim with a statement from the association or insurance company setting forth the terms of the contract and how and with whom settlement was made.
- 8. SERVICE RECORD The original or certified copy of the veteran's service separation document (DD214 or equivalent) which contains information as to the length, time, and character of service will permit prompt processing.

a. HEADSTONE OR MARKER

Only for Veterans who died on or after November 1, 1990 - Furnished for the grave of any eligible deceased Veteran. Will be provided for placement in private cemeteries regardless of whether or not the grave is already marked with a privately-purchased headstone or marker.

Only for Veterans who died before November 1, 1990 - Furnished for the UNMARKED GRAVE of any eligible deceased Veteran. The applicant must certify the grave is unmarked. For Veterans that served prior to World War I, a grave is considered marked when a headstone/marker displays the decedent's name only, or if the name was historically documented in a related document, such as by a number that is inscribed on a grave block and is recorded in a burial ledger. For service during and after World War I, a grave is considered marked if a headstone/marker displays the decedent's name and date of birth and/or death, even though the Veteran's military data is not shown.

- **b. MEMORIAL HEADSTONE OR MARKER** Furnished **for placement in a cemetery only** to commemorate a deceased eligible Veteran whose remains have not been recovered or identified, were buried at sea, donated to science, or cremated and the remains scattered. May not be used as a memento. Check box in block 28 and explain in block 27.
- **c. MEDALLION** Eligible Veterans may receive a Government-furnished headstone or marker, or a medallion, but not both. *If requesting a medallion, please use* **VA Form 40-1330M**.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE - Any deceased Veteran discharged under honorable conditions and any member of the Armed Forces of the United States who dies on active duty. A deceased Veteran discharged under conditions other than honorable may also be eligible. A copy of the deceased Veteran's discharge certificate (DD Form 214 or equivalent) or a copy of other official document(s) establishing qualifying military service must be attached. Do not send original documents; they will not be returned. Service after September 7, 1980, must be for a minimum of 24 months continuous active duty or be completed under special circumstances, e.g., death on active duty. Persons who have only limited active duty service for training while in the National Guard or Reserves are not eligible unless there are special circumstances, e.g., death while on active duty, or as a result of training. Reservists and National Guard members who, at time of death, were entitled to retired pay, or would have been entitled, but for being under the age of 60, are eligible; a copy of the Reserve Retirement Eligibility Benefits Letter must accompany the claim. Reservists called to active duty other than training and National Guard members who are Federalized and who serve for the period called are eligible. Service prior to World War I requires detailed documentation, e.g., muster rolls, extracts from State files, military or State organization where served, pension or land warrant, etc.

WHO CAN APPLY - Federal regulation defines "applicant" as the decedent's Next-of-Kin (NOK); a person authorized in writing by the NOK; or a personal representative authorized in writing by the decedent. Written authorization must be included with claim. A notarized statement is not required.

If there is no official on duty at the cemetery, the signature of the person responsible for the property listed in block 21 is required. Entries of "None," "Not Applicable," or "NA" cannot be accepted. State Veterans' Cemeteries are not required to complete blocks 17, 18, 22 and 23



ILLUSTRATIONS OF STANDARD GOVERNMENT HEADSTONES AND MARKERS

UPRIGHT HEADSTONE WHITE MARBLE OR LIGHT GRAY GRANITE



BRONZE NICHE



This niche marker is 8-1/2 inches long, 5-1/2 inches wide, with 7/16 inch rise. Weight is approximately 3 pounds; mounting bolts and washers are furnished with the marker. Used for columbarium or mausoleum interment. Also provided to supplement a privately-purchased headstone or marker for eligible Veterans who died on or after November 1, 1990 and are buried in a private cemetery.

FLAT MARKERS BRONZE



This grave marker is 24 inches long, 12 inches wide, with 3/4 inch rise. Weight is approximately 18 pounds. Anchor bolts, nuts and washers for fastening to a base are furnished with the marker. The base is not furnished by the Government.

LIGHT GRAY GRANITE OR WHITE MARBLE



This grave marker is 24 inches long, 12 inches wide, and 4 inches thick. Weight is approximately 130 pounds. Variations may occur in stone color; the marble may contain light to moderate veining.

This headstone is 42 inches long, 13 inches wide and 4 inches thick. Weight is approximately 230 pounds. Variations may occur in stone color, and the marble may contain light to moderate veining.

NOTE: Civil War Era headstones - In addition to the headstone and markers pictured, two special styles of upright headstones are available for those who served with Union Forces during the Civil War or for those who served in the Spanish-American War, and another for those who served with the Confederate States of America during the Civil War. Requests for these special styles should be made in block 27 of the claim. It is necessary to submit detailed documentation that supports eligibility. Inscriptions on these headstone types are intentionally limited to assure historic accuracy. For example, only rank above 'Private' was historically authorized; emblems of belief and the words 'Civil War' are not provided.

INSCRIPTION INFORMATION

MEMORIAL HEADSTONES AND MARKERS (remains are not buried). The words "In Memory Of" are mandatory and precede the authorized inscription data. The words "In Memory Of" are only inscribed when remains are not available.

MANDATORY ITEMS of inscription at Government expense are: Legal Name, Branch of Service, Year of Birth, Year of Death, and for State Veterans and National Cemeteries only, the section and grave number. Branches of Service are: U.S. Army (USA), U.S. Navy (USN), U.S. Air Force (USAF), U.S. Marine Corps (USMC), U.S. Coast Guard (USCG), U.S. Army Air Forces (USAAF), and other parent organizations authorized for certain periods of time; and special units such as Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC), Women's Air Force Service Pilots (WASP), U.S. Public Health Service (USPHS), and National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Different examples of inscription formats are illustrated above. More than one branch of service is permitted, subject to space availability.

OPTIONAL ITEMS are identified on the claim in boxes with bold outlines. These items may be included at Government expense if desired. Optional items include month and day of birth in block 5A, month and day of death in block 5B, highest rank attained in block 7, awards in block 9, war service in block 10, and emblem of belief in block 12. War service includes active duty service during a recognized period of war and the individual does not have to serve in the actual place of war, e.g., Vietnam may be inscribed if the Veteran served during the Vietnam War period, even though the individual never served in the country. Supporting documentation must be included with the claim if you wish to include the highest rank and/or awards.


ADDITIONAL ITEMS may be inscribed at Government expense if they are requested on the initial claim and space is available. Examples of additional items include appropriate terms of endearment, nicknames (in expressions such as "OUR BELOVED POPPY"), military or civilian credentials or accomplishments such as DOCTOR, REVEREND, etc., and special unit designations such as WOMEN'S ARMY CORPS, ARMY AIR CORPS, ARMY NURSE CORPS or SEABEES. All requests for additional inscription items should be stated in block 27, and are subject to VA approval. No graphics, emblems or pictures are permitted except available emblems of belief, the Medal of Honor, and the Southern Cross of Honor for Civil War Confederates.

RESERVED SPACE for future inscriptions **at private expense**, such as spousal or dependent data, is allowed if requested in block 27 and if space is available. Only two lines of space may be reserved on flat markers due to space limitations. Reserved space is unnecessary on upright marble or granite headstones as the reverse side is available for future inscriptions.

INCOMPLETE OR INACCURATE INFORMATION ON THE CLAIM MAY RESULT IN ITS RETURN TO THE CLAIMANT, A DELAY IN RECEIPT OF THE HEADSTONE OR MARKER, OR AN INCORRECT INSCRIPTION.

INSTRUCTIONS

A. How can I contact VA if I have questions?

If you have questions about this form, how to fill it out, or about benefits, contact your nearest VA regional office. You can locate the address of the nearest regional office in your telephone book blue pages under "United States Government, Veterans" or call 1-800-827-1000 (Hearing Impaired TDD line 1-800-829-4833). You may also contact VA by Internet at https://iris.va.gov/.

B. How do I apply for a burial flag?

Complete VA Form 27-2008, and submit it to a funeral director or a representative of the veteran or other organization having charge of the funeral arrangements or acting in the interest of the veteran. You may get a flag at any VA regional office or U.S. Post Office. When burial is in a national, State or military post cemetery, a burial flag will be provided.

C. Who is eligible for a burial flag?

Generally, veterans with an other than dishonorable discharge. *Note:* This includes veterans who served in the Philippine military forces while such forces were in the service of the U.S. armed forces under the President's Order of July 26, 1941 and died on or after April 25, 1951, and veterans who served in the Philippine military services are eligible for burial in a national cemetery.

Veterans who were entitled to retired pay for service in the reserves, or would have been entitled to such pay but not for being under 60 years of age.

Members or former members of the Selected Reserve (Army, Air Force, Coast Guard, Marine Corps, or Naval Reserve; Air National Guard; or Army National Guard) who served at least one enlistment or, in the case of an officer, the period of initial obligation, or were discharged for disability incurred or aggravated in line of duty, or died while a member of the Selected Reserve.

D. Who is not eligible for a burial flag?

Veterans who received a dishonorable discharge.

Members of the Selected Reserve whose last discharge from service was under conditions less favorable than honorable.

Peacetime veterans who were discharged before June 27, 1950 and did not serve at least one complete enlistment or incur or aggravate a disability in the line of duty.

Veterans who were convicted of a Federal capital crime and sentenced to death or life imprisonment, or were convicted of a State capital crime and sentenced to death or life imprisonment without parole, or were found to have committed a Federal or State capital crime but were not convicted by reason of not being available for trial due to death or flight to avoid prosecution.

Discharged or rejected draftees, or members of the National Guard, who reported to camp in answer to the President's call for World War I service but who, when medically examined, were not finally accepted for military service.

D. Who is not eligible for a burial flag? (Continued)

Persons who were discharged from World War I service prior to November 12, 1918, on their own application or solicitation by reason of being an alien, or any veterans discharged for alienage during a period of hostilities.

Persons who served with any of the forces allied with the United States in any war, even though United States citizens, if they did not serve with the United States armed forces.

Persons inducted for training and service who, before entering such training and service were transferred to the Enlisted Reserve Corps and given a furlough.

Former temporary members of the United States Coast Guard Reserve.

E. What documentation is required in order to receive a burial flag?

Provide a copy of the veteran's discharge documents that shows service dates and the character of service, such as DD Form 214, or verification of service from the veteran's service department or VA. Various information requested, is considered essential to the proper processing of the application. Ensure these areas are completed as fully as possible. *Note:* If the claimant is unable to provide documentary proof, a flag may be issued when a statement is made by a person of established character and reputation that he/she personally knows the deceased to have been a veteran who meets the eligibility criteria.

F. Who is eligible to receive a burial flag?

Only one flag may be issued for each deceased veteran. Generally, the flag is given to the next-of-kin as a keepsake after its use during the funeral service. The flag is given to the following person(s) in the order of precedence listed:

surviving spouse

children, according to age

parents, including adoptive, stepparents, and foster parents

brothers or sisters, including brothers or sisters of half blood

uncles or aunts

nephews or nieces

others, such as cousins or grandparents

When there is no next-of-kin, VA will furnish the flag to a friend making a request for it. If there is no living relative or one cannot be located, and no friend requests the flag, it must be returned to the nearest VA facility.

Note: The flag cannot be replaced if it is lost, destroyed, or stolen. Additionally, a flag may not be issued after burial unless it was impossible to obtain a flag in time to drape the casket or accompany the urn before burial. If the next-of-kin or friend is requesting the flag after the veteran's burial, he or she must personally sign the application and explain in Item 15 "Remarks" the reason that prevented timely application for a burial flag.

WHAT CAN LEXPECT AT A NATIONAL CEMETERY?

What burial services does VA not provide?

VA does not make funeral arrangements or perform cremations. Families should make these arrangements with a funeral home or cremation provider. Any item or service obtained from a funeral home or cremation provider will be at the family's expense.

What burial benefits are offered in a National Cemetery?

Burial benefits available at **no cost** to the family include a gravesite in any of our 131 national cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a Government headstone or marker, a burial flag and a Presidential Memorial Certificate. Families may choose to have cremated remains buried in the ground or inurned in a columbarium in the same manner and with the same honors as casketed remains.

Burial benefits available for spouses and dependents buried in a national cemetery include burial with the Veteran, perpetual care, and the spouse or dependents name and dates of birth and death will be inscribed on the Veteran's headstone, at no cost to the family. Eligible spouses and dependents may be buried in a national cemetery, even if they predecease the Veteran or if the Veteran is buried elsewhere.

Who is responsible for arranging Military Funeral Honors for the Veteran?

The cemetery will make arrangements for military honors and you may confirm with your FD that honors have been scheduled. Upon the family's request, Public Law 106-65 requires that every eligible Veteran receive a military funeral honors ceremony, to include folding and presenting the United States burial flag and the playing of Taps. The law defines a military funeral honors detail as consisting of two or more uniformed military persons, with at least one being a member of the Veteran's parent service of the armed services. Retirees (20+ years) are eligible for full military honors which includes rifle salute if available. If the military branch cannot provide a rifle salute, local Veterans organizations may have volunteers who will provide this service upon request.

Who provides the burial flag?

The Funeral Director is generally responsible for providing the burial flag and should ensure that the casket will be properly draped with the flag or that the urn is accompanied by a burial flag. In the event you are bringing the urn to the cemetery yourself and you have requested military honors, we will provide the flag in this instance if the funeral Home has not provided it. If you do not have one; you may obtain a burial flag at any VA

Monetary Burial Benefits Regulation Change

VA is proposing to change its monetary burial benefits regulations to pay eligible survivors more quickly and efficiently. If approved, these regulations would authorize VA to pay, without a written application, eligible surviving spouses basic monetary burial benefits at the maximum amount authorized in law through automated systems rather than reimbursing them for actual costs incurred.

- Under current rules, VA pays burial benefits for burial and funeral expenses on a reimbursement basis, which requires survivors to submit receipts for relatively small one-time payments that VA generally pays at the maximum amount permitted by law.
- The proposed amendments to the burial regulations will permit VA to pay, at a flat rate, burial and plot or interment allowances thereby enabling VA to automate payment of burial benefits to eligible surviving spouses.

The changes are intended to help survivors of Veterans bear the cost of funerals by changing regulations to get them the benefits they deserve more quickly

The proposed regulation, if approved, would do the following:

- Restructure, consolidate, and clarify VA's current monetary burial benefits rules to make them easier to understand by Veterans, their survivors, and other stakeholders,
- Clearly establish VA's priority of payments and enable automated payment to eligible surviving spouses,
- Remove the requirement for *eligible* surviving spouses to file a claim for basic burial allowances and simplify the burial claims process for all beneficiaries,
- Establish in regulations a presumption that VA will pay the service-connected (SC) burial allowance for Veterans that were rated totally disabled from service-connected conditions at the date of death, and
- Implement portions of Public Law 112-260, authorizing monetary burial benefits for Veterans without wartime service whose remains are unclaimed.

Statement:

"VA is committed to improving the speed and ease of delivery of monetary burial benefits to Veterans' survivors during their time of need. The proposed changes will permit VA to automatically pay the basic burial or interment allowances to eligible surviving spouses, without the need for a written application. VA wants to help survivors of Veterans bear the cost of funerals by changing regulations to get them the benefits they deserve more quickly."

Retroactive Casket or Urn Reimbursement Requests

On January 10, 2013, Congress enacted the "Dignified Burial and Other Veterans' Benefits Improvement Act of 2012", Public Law 112-260, which authorized the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to furnish a casket or urn of such quality as the Secretary considers appropriate for a dignified burial in a national cemetery of a deceased eligible Veteran who died with no known next of kin and without sufficient financial resources to furnish a casket or urn (Unclaimed Veteran). This authority became effective one year after the date of enactment.

VA published a proposed rule July 2, 2014, in the *Federal Register* to obtain public comments on the casket and urn standards and reimbursement claim procedures. VA published the final rule April 13, 2015. The final rule addresses public comments and codified the casket and urn reimbursement program in section 38.628 of Title 38, Code of Federal Regulations. VA began processing requests for reimbursement May 13th, 2015.

Because the casket and urn authority took effect January 10, 2014, before the regulations were finalized, VA advised individuals or entities to hold their receipts for caskets or urns purchased for the burial of an Unclaimed Veteran. VA will retroactively reimburse for caskets or urns purchased for Veterans who died on or after January 10, 2014, and who were interred in a VA national cemetery after that date. The following information explains the reimbursement process by time frame of interment. For burials that occurred on or after May 13, 2015 see the <u>Unclaimed Veteran Remains Casket or Urn Reimbursement Program Fact Sheet</u>. For information on other benefits available to assist with providing Unclaimed Veterans a dignified burial please see the <u>Unclaimed Veteran Remains Fact Sheet</u>.

Burial in a National Cemetery

Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of our 124 national cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a <u>Government headstone</u> or marker, a <u>burial flag</u>, and a <u>Presidential Memorial Certificate</u>, at no cost to the family. Some veterans may also be eligible for <u>Burial Allowances</u>. Cremated remains are buried or inurned in national cemeteries in the same manner and with the same honors as casketed remains.

Burial benefits available for spouses and dependents buried in a national cemetery include burial with the veteran, perpetual care, and the spouse or dependents name and date of birth and death will be inscribed on the veteran's headstone, at no cost to the family.

Preparing in Advance

For Burial in a VA National Cemetery

Gravesites in <u>Department of Veterans Affairs</u> (VA) national cemeteries cannot be reserved in advance; however, reservations made prior to 1952 will be honored. Families are encouraged to prepare in advance by discussing cemetery options, collecting the veteran's military information including discharge papers, and by contacting the cemetery where burial is desired.

For Burial in a Private Cemetery

We suggest that if burial will be in a private cemetery and a Government headstone or marker will be requested for the veteran's grave, that the family complete <u>VA Form 40-1330</u>, Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker for <u>Installation in a Private or State Veterans' Cemetery</u>, in advance and place it with the veterans military discharge papers for use at the time of need.

UNITED STATES NAVY BURIAL AT SEA PROGRAM

BURIAL AT SEA (BAS) is a means of final disposition of remains that is performed on United States Naval vessels. The committal ceremony is performed while the ship is deployed, therefore, family members are not allowed to be present. The commanding officer of the ship assigned to perform the ceremony will make notification to the family of the date, time, latitude and longitude, once the committal service has been completed.

ELIGIBILITY: Individuals eligible for this program are: (1) active duty members of the uniformed services; (2) retirees and veterans who were honorably discharged. (3) U.S. civilian marine personnel of the Military Sealift Command; and (4) dependent family members of active duty personnel, retirees, and veterans of the uniformed services.

HOW TO GET STARTED: After the death of the individual, for whom the request for BAS is being made, the Person Authorized to Direct Disposition (PADD) will complete the enclosed BAS request/authorization form and ensure all required documentation is included. Documents which must accompany the request: (1) a photocopy of the death certificate; (2) the burial transit permit or the cremation certificate; and (3) a copy of the DD Form 214, discharge certificate, or retirement order.

CREMATED REMAINS (**Cremains**): Cremains must be in an urn, may be temporary (plastic/metal/cardboard) container to prevent spillage in shipping. The cremains, along with the completed BAS package, and the burial flag will be forwarded to the Burial-at-Sea Coordinator at the desired port of embarkation (listed below). Prior to shipment, it is recommended that a phone call be made informing the coordinator of the pending request. It is recommended that the packaged cremains be sent via certified mail, return receipt requested.

INTACT REMAINS (Casketed): Specific guidelines are required for the preparation of casketed remains to be buried at sea. Remains must be in a metal casket. All expenses incurred in this process are the responsibility of the PADD, who will select a funeral home in the area of the port of embarkation. Remains are not forwarded to the receiving funeral home until the coordinator is notified a ship has been assigned and an embarkation date is anticipated. The coordinator will advise regarding shipment to the receiving funeral home to allow sufficient time for casket preparation. The casketed remains, the request form, supporting

documents, and the burial flag are to be forwarded to the receiving funeral home. Once the receiving funeral home has the casket prepared, the coordinator will make the inspection and complete the checklist for the preparation of casketed remains. It is recommended that funeral homes responsible for preparing and shipping intact remains, contact Navy Mortuary Affairs at the Military Medical Support Office in Great Lakes, Illinois to receive the preparation requirements. **NOTE:** Norfolk and San Diego are the only ports for embarkation of intact remains.

BURIAL FLAG: A Burial Flag, is required for all committal services performed aboard United States Naval vessels, with the exception of family members who are not authorized a burial flag. The PADD may wish to send a flag with the remains/cremains to be flown on the vessel during the committal service. Following the services at sea, that flag will be returned to the PADD. If the PADD does not wish to send a burial flag, the ship's flag will be flown during the committal service, but no flag will be forwarded to the family.



1 U.S. Department Of Veterans Affairs (VA) Benefits Do Not Cover All The Funeral Or Cremation Arrangements Of Honorably Discharged Veterans.

There is a common belief that the VA pays for all the funeral or cremation arrangements of an honorably discharged veteran. There are certain monetary, recognition and service benefits that may be available. However, reimbursement for funeral or cremation service expenses is limited and usually only applies to veterans who:

- The Veteran died because of a service-related disability, OR
- The Veteran was receiving or was entitled to receive a VA pension or compensation at the time of death, OR
- The Veteran died while hospitalized by VA or while receiving care under contract at a non-VA facility

Standard guidelines are provided as an overview, but only the VA can rule on your exact benefits.

2 You Will Need Documentation To Verify Military Service.

A "Report of Separation From the Armed Forces of the United States" (discharge papers) is normally required to verify military service.

In most cases, this report is the "DD 214." If this report or its equivalent is not available, a "Request Pertaining To Military Records, Standard Form 180" can be sent to the Military National Personnel Record Center. A

copy of the Report of Separation will be mailed to the veteran, deceased veteran's next of kin or other persons or organizations that are authorized to receive it.

If your family does not have the deceased veteran's DD 214 or discharge papers at the time of death, any Dignity Memorial provider will be glad to help secure one.

3 A Veteran's Family Must Request A United States Flag.

A flag is provided at no cost to drape the casket or accompany the urn of a deceased veteran. Generally, the flag is given to the next of kin. Only one flag may be provided per veteran.

Upon the request of the family, an "Application for United States Flag for Burial Purposes" (VA Form 21-2008) must be submitted along with a copy of the veteran's discharge papers. Flags may be obtained from VA regional offices and most U.S. Post Office

For your family's convenience, your Dignity Memorial provider will be glad to help them request your flag.

Military Funeral Honors Ceremonies Must Be Scheduled In Advance.

Upon the family's request, the law requires that every eligible veteran receive a military funeral honors ceremony, which includes the folding and presentation of the United States flag and the playing of "Taps."

The ceremony is performed by a military funeral honors detail consisting of two or more uniformed military persons and at least one person who is a member of the veteran's branch of the Armed Forces.

This Department of Defense program calls for the funeral director to request military funeral honors on behalf of the veteran's family.

Your Dignity Memorial provider works with various veteran's organizations to assist in the provision of military funeral honors.

5 Veterans' Caskets Are Not Free.

As a standard policy, neither the VA nor the various branches of service provide a free casket for a deceased veteran, unless death occurs while on active duty.

$6^{\,\text{A "Presidential Memorial Certificate"}}$ Must Be Requested.

Initiated in March 1962 by President John F. Kennedy, a "Presidential Memorial Certificate" is an engraved paper certificate, signed by the current President, to honor the memory of honorably discharged, deceased veterans.

Eligible recipients of the certificate include the deceased veteran's next of kin and loved ones. More than one certificate may be requested.

Eligible recipients, or someone acting on their behalf, may apply in person at any VA regional office or by U.S. mail.

Your local Dignity Memorial provider can assist your family in obtaining this certificate.

7 If You Choose Not To Be Buried In A VA National Cemetery, Monetary Burial Benefits Are Limited.

Veterans buried in a private cemetery may be eligible to receive a partial reimbursement for their burial costs. If a death is service-related, benefits up to \$2,000 may be paid for burial expenses.

Based upon eligibility requirements described earlier, for non-service-related deaths on or after October 1, 2011, the VA will pay up to \$700.00 toward burial and funeral expenses (if hospitalized by the VA at time of death), or \$300 toward burial and funeral expenses (if not hospitalized by the VA at time of death), and

a \$700.00 plot-internment allowance (if not buried in a national cemetery). An annual increase in burial and plot allowances will be based on the Consumer Price Index for the preceding 12-month period.

In order to determine the final reimbursement amount, an *Application for Burial Benefits* (VA Form 21-530) must be submitted within two years from the date of the veteran's permanent burial. If your family does not have the Form 21-530 at the time of death, your Dignity Memorial provider will help secure one.

8 There Are Eligibility Requirements For Burial In A VA National Cemetery.

In general, any member of the Armed Forces of the United States who dies while on active duty or any veteran who was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable is entitled to burial in a VA National Cemetery. Under certain conditions, the unremarried surviving spouse and minor children of an eligible person are also entitled to this benefit.

House Bill 3219, passed in 2010, makes provisions for non-Veteran parents to be interred in a National Cemetery with their child if their child was killed in combat or training, and space is available.

Burial in a VA National Cemetery includes:

- an assigned gravesite (if space is available)
- opening and closing of the grave
- a grave liner for casketed remains
- a Government headstone or marker
- perpetual care at no cost to the family

Cremated remains are buried or inurned in VA National Cemeteries in the same manner and with the same honors as casketed remains.

You May Not Reserve Space In a VA National Cemetery Ahead Of Time.

VA national cemeteries only allow arrangements to be made at the time of death. So if you are not choosing burial in a private cemetery, there is no guarantee that spouses or other family members will be interred side-by-side – or even nearby.

Burials In VA National Cemeteries Are Usually Not Conducted On Weekends.

When there are relatives or funeral dignitaries who are attending from out of town, it is important to note that the weekend arrangements private cemeteries will almost always make are not generally provided by VA National Cemeteries.

Your local Dignity Memorial provider will assist you in selecting a cemetery location anywhere in America.

Headstones, Markers or Medallions For A Burial Space In A Private Cemetery Must Be Requested.

Any deceased veteran discharged under conditions other than dishonorable is eligible for a standard Government headstone, marker or medallion. The VA, upon request and at no charge to the applicant, will furnish a Government headstone or marker for the grave of any deceased eligible veteran in any cemetery around the world. A bronze medallion in several sizes is also available to be placed on existing privately purchased headstones or markers. The Government is not responsible for costs associated with affixing the medallion to the privately purchased headstone or marker.

Upright headstones are available in granite or marble, and flat markers are available in granite, marble, or bronze. The style must be consistent with existing monuments or markers at the place of burial. Niche markers for cremated remains are also available.

An "Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker for Installation in a Private or State Veteran's Cemetery" (VA Form 40-1330) must be submitted for headstones or markers. VA Form 40-1330M must be submitted if requesting the medallion.

If your family does not have form 40-1330 or VA form 40-1330M, your Dignity Memorial provider will help secure one.

10 The Issuance Or Replacement Of Military Service Medals, Awards And Decorations Must Be Requested In Writing.

Military service medals, awards and decorations are available from the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) which is under the jurisdiction of the National Archives and Records Administration.

Family members may request medals and awards for living veterans only if they have obtained their signed authorization. For deceased veterans, requests will be accepted from the next-of-kin (unremarried widow or widower, son or daughter, father or mother, brother or sister of the deceased veteran.)

Requests should be submitted in writing to the appropriate military service branch division of the NPRC. Standard Form 180 (SF 180), available through the VA, is recommended to submit your request. Generally, there is no charge for medal or award replacements. For more information, or for the mailing address of the military branch office to submit your request to, please call 1-86-NARA-NARA (1-866-272-6272) or visit the NPRC website at www.archives.gov.

If your family does not have form SF 180 at the time of death, any Dignity Memorial provider will be glad to help secure one.

About This Pamphlet

BURIAL

Reimbursement of Burial Expenses -

A burial allowance may be paid to help offset expenses of the veteran's funeral and burial. The allowance is payable for veterans who:

- died of a service-connected disability, or
- were in receipt of compensation or pension, or retired pay in lieu thereof, or
- died in a VA facility.

Plot Allowance – If not buried in a national cemetery, a plot allowance may be payable for veterans who:

- were discharged for disability incurred or aggravated in the line of duty, or
- were in receipt of compensation or pension, or retired pay in lieu thereof, or
- died in a VA facility.

National Cemetery – Most veterans, their spouses, and dependent children are eligible for burial in one of VA's national cemeteries at no cost to the family. Many states have veterans cemeteries, built with VA grants, with similar benefits.

Headstone or Marker – VA provides a headstone or marker for veterans buried in any cemetery worldwide.

Flag – An American flag is provided to drape the casket or accompany the urn of an eligible veteran. The flag is presented to the veteran's next of kin upon burial.

Presidential Memorial Certificates –

Family and other loved ones may request these personalized certificates.

DEPENDENCY AND INDEMNITY COMPENSATION (DIC)

DIC is a monthly benefit paid to unmarried surviving spouses and dependent children of servicemembers who die during active military service, or veterans who:

- die after military service because of a service-connected disability, *or*
- were receiving or entitled to receive VA compensation for a service-connected disability that was rated as totally disabling
 - for at least 10 years immediately preceding death, or
 - since the veteran's release from active duty and for at least five years immediately preceding death, or
 - for at least one year immediately preceding death if the veteran was a former prisoner of war.

*See note about restoration of entitlement

PARENTS' DIC

This is a monthly benefit paid to parents of veterans who die in service or as a result of a service-connected disability. There are qualifying income limits and the amount payable varies based on the parents' other income.

DEATH PENSION

Death pension is a monthly benefit paid to unmarried surviving spouses and dependent children of wartime veterans whose death is not due to a serviceconnected disability. There are qualifying income limits and the amount payable varies based on the amount of other income.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Education and training benefits are available to unmarried surviving spouses and dependent children of

- servicemembers who die during active military service, *or*
- veterans who die of a service-connected disability, or
- veterans who were rated permanently and totally disabled due to a serviceconnected disability at the time of death.

There are time limits for use of this benefit. A surviving spouse has 10 years from the date that eligibility is established, but 20 years if the veteran died while on active duty. Children are eligible from age 18 to 26. Educational and vocational counseling, and employment as a work-study student, are also available.

HOME LOAN GUARANTY

The unmarried surviving spouse of a veteran whose death was service connected is generally eligible for this program. VA guarantees loans to purchase a home, including a condominium or manufactured home, or to refinance an existing home loan.

*See note about restoration of entitlement

HEALTH CARE

The Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Department of Veterans Affairs (CHAMPVA) provides coverage for unmarried surviving spouses and children of veterans who:

- died of a service-connected disability, or
- were permanently and totally disabled due to a service-connected disability at the time of death, *or*
- died in service in the line of duty, and the dependents are not eligible for Department of Defense TRICARE benefits.

*Note: Restoration of Entitlement -

Entitlement may be restored for a surviving spouse who remarried after the veteran's death if the remarriage ended in death, divorce, or annulment. A surviving spouse that remarries at age **57** or older, or at age **55** or older for CHAMPVA entitlement, generally retains entitlement to DIC, home loan guaranty, and education and training benefits.

LIFE INSURANCE PROCEEDS

The veteran may have had an active life insurance policy with VA. Such policies include:

- United States Government Life Insurance
- National Service Life Insurance
- Veterans Special Life Insurance
- Veterans Reopened Insurance
- Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance
- Veterans Mortgage Life Insurance
- Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance (SGLI)*
- Veterans' Group Life Insurance (VGLI)*

*Free financial counseling is available to SGLI and VGLI beneficiaries.

EDUCATION PROGRAM REFUND

Montgomery GI Bill (MGIB) – If the veteran died while on active duty, or within one year of separation or discharge due to a service-connected disability, the beneficiary of the veteran's SGLI or VGLI policy is eligible for a refund of the veteran's MGIB military pay reductions which were not paid to the veteran in benefits.

Veterans Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) – A veteran's designated survivor is eligible to be refunded the veteran's VEAP contributions that were not paid to the veteran in benefits.

RELATED BENEFITS

CIVIL SERVICE PREFERENCE

The unmarried surviving spouse of certain deceased veterans (for example, war-time veterans) may qualify for hiring preference within the Federal government. The mother of a veteran who died during military service is also eligible. VA provides an eligibility certification upon request.

COMMISSARY AND EXCHANGE PRIVILEGES

The Armed Forces provide commissary and exchange privileges to the unremarried surviving spouse of veterans who die of a service-connected disability. VA provides an eligibility certification upon request.

Visiting the Cemetery


Thousands of people visit the National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona each year. Many come for a committal service or to visit the gravesite of a loved one, others to attend special observances or to enjoy the peaceful setting. We welcome all visitors to this shrine for our nation's heroes.

The cemetery is open to the public daily from sunrise to sunset for visitation of cemetery grounds. Specific gravesites can be found using an automated gravesite locator kiosk at the public information center. A Nationwide Gravesite Locator for national cemeteries is also available on the Internet at http://www.cem.va.gov.

General cemetery information is available in the public information center. Visitors to specific gravesites may park along the edge of the road near the gravesite they are visiting. Restrooms and a water fountain are located in the public information center.

Visitors attending committal services should gather at the Public Information Center or scheduled committal shelter. Roadway parking is available throughout the cemetery and near the committal shelter during services. Special observances and ceremonies are held at the amphitheatre.

VA regulations 38 CFR 1.218 prohibit the carrying of firearms (either openly or concealed), explosives or other dangerous or deadly weapons while on VA property, except for official purposes, such as military funeral




honors. Possession of firearms on any property under the charge and control of VA is prohibited. Offenders may be subject to a fine, removal from the premises, or arrest.

A Memorial Day ceremony is held annually the last Monday in May. For the time and date of the ceremony, call the cemetery office at (480) 513-3600.

While we invite visitors to the National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona, we remind them of its solemn purpose and ask that they act in a dignified manner while on the cemetery grounds. For this reason, public gatherings of a partisan nature are not permitted. In addition, sports or recreational activities are not permitted, including:

- Bicycle riding
- Jogging
- Picnicking
- Roller blading
- Walking of pets
- Fishing or hunting






Directions:



Making Burial Arrangements

The funeral home or next-of-kin should contact the National Cemetery Scheduling Office to make burial arrangements for Veterans, spouses and/or eligible dependents.

The funeral home can fax all available military discharge documents to the National Cemetery Scheduling Office at (866) 900-6417 or scan and email the documentation to NCA.Scheduling@va.gov with the name of the decedent in the Subject Line. Follow up with a call to (800) 535-1117 in order to schedule the interment.

The scheduling office will be open seven (7) days a week, from 7 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., Central time, except for Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

Please contact the cemetery directly to:

- Schedule active duty interments
- Schedule memorial services without interment
- Cancel or reschedule interments
- Change information initially provided to the scheduling office
- Request disinterment or relocation of remains

Burial benefits provided by the National Cemetery Administration, at no cost to the veteran, include: burial plot; opening and closing of the gravesite; a government liner; headstone or marker with inscription; interment flag; perpetual care of the gravesite; and a Presidential Memorial Certificate. Funeral director's services are not covered. Gravesites are assigned by the cemetery and cannot be selected in advance. Assignments are made without regard to rank, ethnic or religious background, branch of service or other factors.

The Veteran and spouse are interred in the same grave. If both were Veterans, they may choose to be buried side-byside in separate graves.

Military honors are provided by the Department of Defense and are to be arranged by the funeral director. If there is no funeral director, cemetery staff will assist the family in arranging for military honors.

Burials and interments are scheduled between 9 a.m. and 2:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, except designated holidays. Out of respect for all persons buried at the cemetery the main flag is lowered to half-staff 30 minutes before the first service, where it remains until 30 minutes following the last service of the day.

National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona has the following burial site options:

- · Casket: in-ground only
- · Cremation: in-ground
- Cremation: above-ground columbarium

The administration office is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and closed on designated holidays.
